




I think spending time with your family on Passover is special. I know all the children love staying up until midnight. Going places and traveling and seeing family.

A PESACH DVAR TORAH

The Haggadah says that the Torah talks about 4 different types of people who come to the seder. Those people are the Chacham (wise person), Rasha (evil person), Tam (simpleton) and She'eino Yodea Lishol (one who can't even ask).

Question:

Why are they listed in this order? Seemingly it should start with Chacham and end with the Rasha. And even more so, why do we even invite the Rasha to the seder in the first place?

Answer:

The Gemara says אף אל פי שחטא ישראל הוא -"even though he sinned he is still a Jew." Every Jew, no matter who, has a neshama. It is just that by some people it might be covered up and hidden.

That is what the Haggadah is coming to teach us by putting the Chacham next to the Rasha. It shows that just like the Chacham has a Neshama the Rasha does too, even though he does a lot of sins. And he is also connected to Hashem no less than the other sons.

It says that the Jewish nation is compared to the Torah because the Torah has hundreds of thousands of letters and if even just one letter is missing the whole thing is pasul (not usable). And the same is with us Jews, if even just one of us are missing, the whole nation is incomplete. So by making sure that even the Rasha is by the Seder, all Jews are united and complete.

Additionally, the Haggadah's lesson to the Chacham is that he should see it as his obligation to help and teach the Rasha. And that's not all, the Rebbe introduces a fifth son which is the son that doesn't even come to the Seder cause he doesn't even know about it and it is up to us to bring him to the Seder and to teach him about Hashem and about Torah and Mitzvos.

And through the unity of all the Jews we will have Moshiach speedily in our days and when Moshiach comes, which will be this Pesach, we will merit to celebrate Pesach with the Korban Pesach in the Beis Hamikdash in Yerushalayim!

Paraoh said "sure" but did his let the Jews go? Absolutely no.


Another 9 happened and by the last one Paraoh was scared

Elijah's First Seder

The Rabbi blessed his potato, dipped it in the water, and ate it. I started getting used to the blessing before eating. I like my potatoes without water so I just ate mine plain. Next, the Rabbi said we needed to break the middle "Matza" in half and put away the larger piece for later. I had no idea what a "Matza" was, but it sounded like a Mazda. 

In Germany right before the war broke out, my great grandfather and his family escaped to England. When they arrived in England, the English thought they were German spies and put them on a ship to Australia.

The Ship was called the Denira and the people on the ship were treated terribly. They had horrible conditions and many of their things were thrown overboard. When they arrived in Australia they were put in an internment camp (which was kind of like a prison) in a town called Hay. Once at the camp my Zaide realized it was almost Pesach and he really wanted to have a seder and to say the whole Haggadah. However there was no Haggadahs in the camp. My zaide was only 20 years old at the time, but managed to write the entire haggadah by heart. The other "prisoners" were able to copy it and together they held a seder in the internment camp in 1941.

Eventually my Great Grandfather was allowed to leave the camp because the Jewish community in Melbourne needed a shochet and my zaide was one; so they secured his release. I am not sure of the haggadahs exact journey at this point, but what I do

know is that years later the Haggadah ended up on display in the Jewish Museum in Melbourne, Australia. It remains there today for everyone to see my zaide's amazing memory and commitment to Torah and Mitzvos even during really difficult times.

Because you said עזבוּ בריתך you will witness the circumcision of a male jew entering the covenant, in fact you will be known as Eliyahu Malchus Habris! Eliyahu the gatekeeper of the bris.

And because you said את מזבחתך הראשוּ you will represent when every jewish family sits a round a table and celebrates the seder, when their tables are transformed into hashem's alters.

And because you said ויבשר אני ליבדו am the only jew left. Not true! You will crash many more Jewish Simchot than anyone in history.



That night at the seder the Baal Shem Tov asked his host if there is anything he could bless him with. The man responded that Thank G-d Hashem had blessed them with wealth but sadly no child. The Besht blessed them with a child. A voice came down from heaven saying that this couple was not supposed to have a child and so the Baal Shem Tov lost his place in olam haba. The Baal Shemtov responded with excitement that now he can serve HASHEM with no ulterior motive. In response another voice came down from heaven saying you just earned your olam haba back plus another portion. (continued on page 20)

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Next, the Besht threw back his head, went into a trance, and became pale. The host started to panic until Udel reassured him that this was a common occurrence. The Besht stood like that for a couple of hours and came out of his trance at about dawn, pointed to the window where you were able to see the president of the local Jewish community walking by and said "Le'osei Niflaot Gedolot".

Later they all found out about the great miracle that had occurred; The Turkish Sultan was a great friend of the Jews and treated them well. When this Sultan passed away his young son took over. The new ruler had an advisor that did not like the Yidden and was intent on finding a way to take them down. 

The people on the ship drew lots and threw The Beshts son in law into the sea. The storm still went strong, so The Baal Shem Tov threw his holy papers into the water and the seas became calm. The ship stopped at an island. The Besht and his scribe ended up being captured by cannibals. They escaped by burning through the ropes with their passionate recitation of the Aleph Beis.

By the time they made it back to the port the only ship there was a ship heading away from Eretz Yisroel and back to Constantinople. In Turkey they met up with The Beshts son in law who had been saved by a sailor they believed to be Eliyahu Hanavi. The Besht realized that Hashem did not want him going to Eretz Yisroel and they headed back to Mezhibuzh.



The Names of Pesach

Pesach has three names: חג המצות, זמן חרותנו and חסס. The one most commonly referred to by us is Pesach, but if you look into any Haggadah it will almost always say Chag Hamatzos. So why do we use a different name than Hashem for this yomtov?

We get the name Chag Hamatzos from when the Jews were leaving Egypt and they didn't have any time for their bread to rise. The Torah shows us a different perspective and tells us that it was not that the Jews didn't have any time for the bread to rise, but they were just too eager to get to Matan Torah that they didn't want to waste time on their bread rising.

We get the name Pesach/Passover from when Hashem came around with the last makkah of מכת and passed over all of us Jews, sparing us from being harmed.

We use the name pesach as a thanks to Hashem for passing over us. The same goes for Hashem's name for this holiday. He calls it Chag Hamatzos in a thanks to us for being so ready and excited for the receiving of the Torah that we didn't want the small things to distract us.


A Scary Discovery



At around 7:00 guests start arriving, people socialize then everyone sits down and we make kiddush and do the first few steps.


My Grandfather speaks and asks everyone questions, we might play a game or two.

A Seder in my home is warm and cozy with everyone enjoying themselves.


It's very meaningful to be a role model for all the people in my grandparents community, and to teach them all about pesach.

Dever/Domestic Animals Die - The Yidden were forced to tend to the Egyptians cattle. Therefore, the Egyptians domestic cattle & sheep died.






